Main Themes: Humility& Grace

- Humility is having accurate self-knowledge. Because of sin, self-knowledge is impossible without a true knowledge of God.
- Grace is God's mercy and love expressed towards sinners.
- Relationship: God is opposed to the proud but gives grace to the humble.

John Calvin

knowledge of himself unless he has first looked upon God's face, and then descends from contemplating him to scrutinize himself. For we always seem to ourselves righteous and upright and wise and holy -- this pride is innate in all of us -- unless by clear proofs we stand convinced of our own unrighteousness, foulness, folly, and impurity. ... We must infer that man is never sufficiently touched and affected by the awareness of his lowly state until he has compared himself with God's majesty. (1.1.2-3)

Love: Serve one another fulfilling your role (5:1-5)

Refers

- Peter's humility: Peter could have reminded them of his apostleship, but instead, he reminds them of his greatest failure.
- COMMAND: "Shepherd the flock of God" The very same charge that the risen Christ gave to Peter, he now gives to the elders. (See Ezek. 34)

Ezek. 34

Feeding God's people
Strengthening the sickly
Healing the diseased
Binding up the broken
Bringing back the scattered
Seeking the lost

Love: Serve one another fulfilling your role (5:1-5)

- Regional Not unwillingly, not out of obligation, but willingly
- Not overpowering (exercising one's authority to one's advantage) but as examples.
- Calvin: "In exhorting pastors to their duty, he points out three vices especially which are often to be found, namely sloth, desire for gain, and lust for power."

Love: Serve one another fulfilling your role (5:1-5)

A Young People

COMMAND: "Be subject to your elders" = respect & obedience.

Reveryone

COMMAND: "Be clothed with humilty" = Paul describes how this honest assessment will express itself in regarding others to be more important than ourselves (Phil 2:3).

Schreiner: "Humility is the oil that allows relationships in the church to run smoothly and lovingly."

Real In Greek, the verb can use one of three voices:

- Active—/ opened the door. --- Subject performs the action.
- Middle—I opened the door for myself—Subject both performs the action and receives the action or benefits.
- Passive—The door was opened for me—subject receives action. Something is being done to me or for me.

Resture towards God

- COMMAND: "Humble yourself" = Imperative Passive: Perhaps better translated, "Allow yourselves to be humbled..." willingly submit to God. Do not resist God's activity in your life.
 - C HOW? "by casting" = Lay something on the back of another. (1 Peter 2:23; 4:19)

Resture towards God

- Peter has used multiple words to get at the same thing:
 - (2:23) Hand over

 - œ "epirripto" (5:7) transfer, cast upon

Resture towards God

- COMMAND: "Humble yourself" = Imperative Passive: Perhaps better translated, "Allow yourselves to be humbled..." willingly submit to God. Do not resist God's activity in your life.
 - C HOW? "by casting" = Lay something on the back of another. (1 Peter 2:23; 4:19)
 - ₩HY? "because he cares for you" God's mighty hand is a caring hand. God takes pains over that which He cares for most.



Resture towards Satan

- Peter does not dwell much on Satan and his activity. Yes, we are to be aware of the devil's involvement and his intentions and resist him, but we must understand our suffering to be coming directly from the mighty hand of a loving Father.
- **Be sober, be on the alert (watchful)=** Note 1:13; 4:7
 - Resolver in order to hope in the second coming
 - Resolver in order to pray
 - Resolver in order to resist the devil
- Your adversary, the devil= Your accuser, the slanderer. Behind the accusations and slander from neighbors, coworkers, family members is the devil himself.

- COMMAND: "Resist" (antistēte)= Stand against the devil. The authority to resist the devil depends on our submission to God.
 - **HOW?** by staying firm in faith (trusting in God).
 - ₩HY? Because we know God causes all his people to experience suffering as a fulfillment of his objective and purpose (being accomplished- epiteleo).

The Promise of Salvation (5:10-11)

Promise: He who began a good work will complete it. He who called you will perfect you.

- God himself will make you whole (katartizo)
- God himself will make you inwardly firm and secure (stērizo)
- God himself will strengthen you (sthenōo)
- God himself will firmly establish you (themelioo)
- Means: How will God fulfill his promise? Not in spite of suffering but through suffering!

Final Greeting (5:12-14)

(3) that we have been called.

(3) that we will be perfected, confirmed, strengthened and established through suffering.

3) that we will inherit eternal glory in Christ.

Conclusion: The relationship between sin, suffering, God, and Satan

- Sin and suffering are not identical. Sin causes suffering and suffering can cause sin but suffering is not sin.
- God stands above sin & suffering: 1) God is sovereign, in control of it. 2) He is not the author of it.
- A Satan stands behind sin & suffering: 1) He is not sovereign. 2) Sin and resulting suffering can be traced back to him.


Conclusion: The relationship between sin, suffering, God, and Satan

Real Both God and Satan have an agenda when it comes to suffering:

Satan seeks to destroy us

God seeks to exalt us

- Real It is our posture toward God that determines our posture toward Satan.
 - To resist God (pride) is to forfeit grace and succumb to Satan.
 - To submit to God (humility) is receive and stand in grace and resist the devil.



Conclusion: Peter's Life Experience

Reter failed to keep watch: Mark 14:37

- Peter resisted God, not the devil in the face of persecution: Luke 22:49
- Peter succumbed to the lion's roar: He denied Christ three times out of fear. Mark 14:66-72
- Peter was restored by Christ and commanded to:
 strengthen your brothers Luke 22:32
 shepherd my sheep John 21:16

Question for August 19
