I. Background

- A. Josiah's Reign
 - 1. Revelation of the goodness of God
 - a. Because of the sin of Manasseh, judgment would come
 - b. God raises up a godly man as king
 - c. God gives a chance for individuals to repent
 - 2. Josiah is prosperous because of:
 - a. Personal godliness
 - b. The turnover in dominant world powers
 - (1) Assyria is in rapid decline
 - (2) Babylonians are on the rise
 - 3. Josiah's reforms brought outward return to God but plenty of sin remained

II. Habakkuk

- A. Probably spoke in the time between 610 and 614 BC
 - 1. He had heard of the exploits of the Babylonians
- B. The message of Habakkuk is not presented as sermons but as a personal testimony
- C. Outline
 - 1. A Question ----- Ch. 1
 - 2. An Answer ----- Ch. 2
 - 3. A Prayer ----- Ch. 3

- D. There are two questions:
 - 1. Why do I pray for you to deal with sin in the nation and you do not answer?
 - a. Answer to Habakkuk: *I am answering the Chaldeans are coming*
 - b. The answer does not calm Habakkuk's concerns but raises a second question
 - 2. How can you righteously judge a backslidden people through a completely ungodly people?
 - a. God's first answer: You heard right Babylon will be used to judge Israel
 - b. You are wrong in your concept of justice
 - (1) You are looking at things on the basis of relative righteousness
 - (2) The issue is not righteousness and unrighteousness but faith and pride
 - c. Key verse: Habakkuk 2:4
 - (1) The *proud* are not right in their soul
 - (2) The righteous will live by his *faith*
 - d. This becomes one of the key verses for understanding faith in the NT
 - (1) Romans: Have life by faith
 - (2) Galatians: Have life by **faith**
 - (3) Hebrews: Live continually by faith

"Behold, as for the proud one,
His soul is not right within him;
But the righteous will live by his
faith."

~ Habakkuk 2:4
