# Songs Messiah Jesus Christ in the Psalms

- I. Introduction The Unique Use of the Psalm in Matthew 4:1-11
  - A. Here it is the devil who quotes the verses.
  - B. Jesus' actions are saturated with the confidence expressed in Psalm 91.
- II. GENERAL OBSERVATION ABOUT THE TEMPTATION OF JESUS
  - A. The situation Why did Jesus go to the wilderness?
    - 1. The events follow immediately on the baptism of Jesus.
    - 2. The purpose of the forty days was to be tested.
    - 3. Jesus is completely in submission to the plan.

# B. A problem - Can Jesus really be tempted?

- 1. Jesus (like Adam) has no tendency to sin.
- 2. There is an external tempter.
- 3. Apart from a sinful nature, human need adds power to temptation.

# III. THE PARTICULARS OF THE FINAL, CLIMACTIC CONFLICT

#### A. Turn the stones into bread.

- 1. The Issue Will Jesus trust His Father to take care of His physical needs?
- 2. The Principle Following God's instructions is more important to life than food itself.

### B. Jump off the wall.

- 1. The Issue Will Jesus believe in the Father's loving care despite the difficulty of the moment?
- 2. The Principle The person who makes God his refuge is protected even when things go wrong and there is no sense of His presence.

## C. Become king without suffering and humiliation.

- 1. The Issue Will Jesus submit to the hard and unfair path to His kingdom?
- 2. The Principle God alone is to be worshiped no matter what the cost.

#### EXODUS 17:7
